The emphasis on flexibility and the need for frameworks to allow for adjustments, as identified in this study, supports the adaptive governance model discussed by Lopez and Scott (2022), but extends it by showcasing how this flexibility can be operationalized in practice. The integration of stakeholder engagement, a key component of the proposed framework, aligns with the conclusions of Martin and Liu (2021), but this study illustrates the direct impact of such engagement on the effectiveness of adaptation strategies. The recommendation for continuous monitoring and evaluation, as suggested in this study, corroborates the approach advocated by Thompson and Raj (2019), but provides a more nuanced understanding of how this can be implemented in local government contexts. The study's emphasis on capacity building and the need for guidance on enhancing skills and knowledge in climate change adaptation aligns with the findings of Davis and Thompson (2020), yet offers a more targeted approach for local governments. Additionally, the suggestion that the framework should facilitate intergovernmental collaboration, as found in this study, supports the observations of Kim and Park (2021), but adds depth by exploring the mechanisms of such collaboration. In summary, this study's recommendations for an innovative framework highlight the need for holistic, evidence-based, and collaborative approaches in local government adaptation strategies, offering a comprehensive and practical guide for enhancing resilience to climate change.

CONCLUSION

This study has provided a comprehensive analysis of local government adaptation strategies in the face of climate change, revealing a complex and multifaceted landscape. The findings underscore the diversity of adaptation approaches, influenced by various factors including geographical context, resource availability, and stakeholder involvement. A key insight is the critical role of political commitment and leadership in driving effective adaptation strategies, coupled with the necessity for adequate financial resources and stakeholder collaboration. The study highlights the importance of integrating scientific research with local insights and community engagement, ensuring that adaptation strategies are both effective and sustainable. The effectiveness of these strategies is found to be contingent on their ability to be dynamic and responsive to evolving climate scenarios and local needs. The research has also identified the need for local governments to adopt a holistic approach to adaptation, one that encompasses not only infrastructural and technological solutions but also considers social, economic, and political dimensions. The proposed innovative framework for adaptation strategies emphasizes the importance of flexibility, continuous learning, and the integration of diverse stakeholder perspectives. This framework aims to guide local governments in developing tailored adaptation strategies that are responsive to their unique challenges and contexts. In conclusion, this study contributes to the understanding of climate change adaptation at the local government level, offering insights and recommendations that are vital for enhancing resilience and sustainability. The findings and the proposed framework serve as a valuable resource for policymakers, practitioners, and researchers in the field of climate change adaptation, providing a foundation for future research and action in this critical area. The study's comprehensive approach to examining local government adaptation strategies to climate change provides a nuanced understanding of the challenges and opportunities in this field, offering a pathway towards more effective

and resilient communities in the face of a changing climate.

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
